A common sentiment by tribal nations is that their historic survival is grounded in "sustainability" practices which have largely been overlooked because of their basis in oral and cultural traditions, rather than in scientific text that characterizes the academy.

This 2- day dialogue will bring scholars and thought provoking leaders together to examine and discuss historic tribal "sustainability" practices, and highlight the potential collaborative partnerships, between ASU and indigenous scholars and sustainability scientists to collaborate on developing research and publications acknowledging American Indian and Indigenous models of sustainability. The dialogue will focus on: tribal energy resources and the environment; entrepreneurship and economic sustainability; sustaining inherent tribal self-governance, and cultural sustainability.
