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Dorothee Elmiger, born in 1985 in Switzerland, studied philosophy and political science, and spent a year as an exchange student in New Hampshire. She has lived and worked in Berlin since 2009, where she is currently pursuing a graduate degree in political science. She won the Kelag Prize in the 2010 Ingeborg Bachmann contest. Her debut novel, *Einladung an die Waghalsigen*, won the Aspeckte Prize for Debut Novels.



Andrea Grill was born in Bad Ischl in 1975 and studied in Salzburg before earning her doctorate at the University of Amsterdam with a dissertation on "The Evolution of Butterflies Common to Sardinia." Her essays, stories, and poetry have appeared in newspapers and journals. She has published two novels: *Tränenlachen* (2008) and *Zweischritt* (2007), both with Otto Müller Verlag, Salzburg. Andrea Grill also translates from Albanian into German. She has lived in Tirana, Cagliari (Sardinia), Neuchatel und Bologna, and today resides in



Julia Schoch, born in Bad Saarow in 1974 and lives in Potsdam. Her debut story collection, *Der Körper des Salamanders* (Piper, 2001), was awarded the Förderpreis des Friedrich-Hölderlin-Preises and the Annette-von-Droste-Hülshoff-Preis, a.o, followed in 2004 by the novel, *Verabredungen mit Mattok* (Piper). In 2005 she received the Jury Prize of the Ingeborg Bachmann Competition in Klagenfurt. Her latest novel, *Mit der Geschwindigkeit des Sommers* (Piper, 2009) was nominated for the Belletristik-Preis of the Leipzig Book Fair. Honored for her translation work, Schoch has won the André Gide-Preis for French-German literary translation. The author's website is: www.juliaschoch.de.



Antje Rávic Strubel's novels include *Kältere Schichten der Luft* (S. Fischer, 2007), *Tupolew 134* (C.H. Beck, 2004), and *Unter Schnee* (DTV, 2001), translated as *Snowed Under* (Red Hen Press, 2006). Her series of essays on Sweden have been collected as *Gebrauchsanweisung für Schweden* (Piper, 2008). She received numerous literary awards, including the Hermann Hesse Prize (2007). Rávic Strubel has translated Joan Didion's Year of Magical Thinking into German as well as a collection of her essays. A resident of Potsdam, she currently teaches at the Institute for Creative Writing of Leipzig University. Her newest novel is being published by S.Fischer Verlag in August 2011.



Peter Weber was an accomplished athlete while in school, but, following an accident when he was 19, he began to write instead. His first novel, *Der Wettermacher*, was published in 1993. This was followed by *Silber und Salbader* (1999), *Bahnhofsprosa* (2002), and *Die melodielosen Jahre* (2007), all from Suhrkamp Verlag. *Die melodielosen Jahre* was awarded the Solothurner Literature Prize. From 2004-2005, he was the official writer of the city of Bergen. He currently lives in Istanbul.



Andrea Winkler was born in Freistadt in 1972, and studied German Literature and Theater. She has received a number of literary awards, among them the Abraham Woursell Award and the Förderungspreis der Republik Österreich. Her publications include: Schatten(spiele). Poetologische Denkwege zu Friederike Mayröcker. (Kovac, 2004), Arme Närrchen. Selbstgespräche (Droschl, 2006), Hanna und ich (Droschl, 2008) and Drei, vier Töne, nicht mehr. Elf Rufe (Zsolnay, 2010).



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
