On October 1, 2012, **Ghassan Zaqtan**, a leading poet of the Arab world, and award-winning poet and translator **Fady Joudah** will embark together on a month-long U.S. book tour that will take them to 15 venues in support of Joudah's inspired and critically acclaimed translation of Zaqtan's work, *Like a Straw Bird It Follows Me, and Other Poems*..

The volume, published by Yale University Press earlier this year, includes Joudah's translation of Zaqtan's tenth and most recent poetry collection *Like a Straw Bird It Follows Me* as well as selected earlier poems, thus bringing to English-language readers the best work by one of the most important and original Palestinian poets of our time.

Zaqtan is the author of ten collections of poetry. He is also a novelist, editor, and filmmaker. Born in Beit Jala, near Bethlehem, he has lived in Jordan, Beirut, Damascus, and Tunis. He returned to Palestine in 1994 and now lives in Ramallah.

His translator **Fady Joudah** is a Palestinian-American medical doctor and an award-winning poet and translator. Among his translations are two poetry collections by Mahmoud Darwish, *If I Were Another* and *The Butterfly's Burden*. His own collection of poems, *The Earth in the Attic* (2008), was selected by Louise Glück for publication in the prestigious Yale Series of Younger Poets. Dr. Joudah lives in Houston, Texas.


Together, the two poets will appear at lectures, readings, discussions, and book signings hosted by an array of distinguished institutions throughout October 2012 (see attached schedule for details). Beginning at Amherst Books in Massachusetts, their U.S, tour will bring them to audiences at Harvard, Boston University, Brandeis University, Scripps College, UT Austin, Yale, the New York State Writers Institute / SUNY Albany, the Asian American Writers Workshop in New York City, New York University, Columbia, Georgetown, Westmont College, and UCLA, before concluding with a Rice University/University of Houston event.

At month's end, the two authors will immediately proceed to London, to appear at both the Qattan Foundation and the Aldeburgh International Poetry Festival in Suffolk, UK, at the start of November.

Like a Straw Bird It Follows Me, and Other Poems is a volume in the Margellos World Republic of Letters series from Yale University Press. The series is dedicated to making literary works from around the globe available in English through translation. It brings to the English-speaking world the work of leading poets, novelists, essayists, philosophers, and playwrights from Europe, Latin America, Africa, Asia, and the Middle East, to stimulate discourse and creative exchange.

With the poems in this volume, Zaqtan illuminates what Arabic poetry in general and Palestinian poetry in particular are capable of. Departing from the lush aesthetics of such celebrated predecessors as Mahmoud Darwish and Adonis, Zaqtan's daily, delicate narrative, whirling catalogues, and at times austere aesthetics represent a new trajectory, a significant leap for young Arabic poets today.

In his preface, Fady Joudah analyzes and explores the poet's body of work: "Ghassan Zaqtan's poems, in their constant unfolding," he writes, "invite us to enter them, exit them, map and unmap them, code and decode them, fill them up and empty them, with the living and nonliving, the animate and inanimate, toward a true freedom."
